About the Author



Discussion Topics

Before, during and after reading the book

- 1. Introduce A Tree for Everyone to the children and ask them what they think the story might be about.
- 2. Jake, Pip and Aiden love playing imaginary games in an old oak tree. What games do they play? Have you ever made a camp/treehouse or played games in a tree before?
- 3. Why do the three children feel threatened by the new arrivals? Would you feel threatened?
- 4. What happens?
- 5. RIP! CRACK! SMASH! Can you think of any other onomatopoeias?
- 6. What happens after the fight? How does everyone feel?
- 7. How does the resolution happen?
- 8. Do you think saying 'sorry' is important? Think about different ways of saying sorry.
- 9. After reading the book, ask them what did they think of the story? Which was their favourite part and why?









Can you help Jake find the oak tree?






A TREE FOR EVERYONE FUN FRIENDSHIP CLASS ACTIVITY
