
TEACHING NOTES: QUICKLY SLOWLY DAY


ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR

TEACHING NOTES: QUICKLY SLOWLY DAY

EDUCATIONAL APPLICABILITY

Quickly Slowly Day delves into a topic not often shown in children's picture books – the passage of time. Even adults find it hard to understand why some moments race by, while others drag. Through this enchanting story, time is shown clearly through the young bear's experiences of a busy, quickly-slowly day.

DISCUSSION TOPICS

Read the book together, asking questions throughout.

- I. Look at the cover of the book together. What do you think the story might be about?
- 2. Talk about the fact that an event might be taking the same amount of time as another (by the clock), but one event seems longer than the other. Even adults struggle with this idea!
- 3. Name all the activities in the story which the young bear thinks race by. Then name all the activities which seem to go slowly.
- 4. When events/activities go fast, how do you feel? Are you enjoying the activity? How do you feel when the activity seems to be going very slowly? Happy/sad?
- 5. Ask if they think that *Quickly Slowly Day* is a good title for the book. What other titles can they think of?
- 6. What did the children think of the book? If they liked it, why did they like it? What was their favourite part?







Fill in the columns below. On the left put daily activities that go really quickly, and on the right, write down activities that seem to go really slowly. Now compare your answers with your friends' answers.










ROLL THE DICE




ANIMAL SPEED


Look at the animals below. Which animals are fast and which are slow? Circle the answer! After you've circled the answers, colour the animals in.


